The past year has seen Soroptimists continue to make significant strides in both advocacy and action, reinforcing our commitment to empowering women and girls worldwide. Through collaborative initiatives, community outreach, and steadfast representation at local and international levels, our members have championed causes ranging from gender equality to access to education and healthcare.

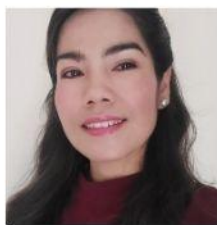

## The Membership Committee meets across the time zones to plan and implement the Membership Section of the SISEAP Strategic Plan 2021 – 2026

Total Clubs 119 as at YE December 2025. (Refer Table 1 below).

Although some clubs in Australia and New Zealand have a larger membership, the typical Soroptimist club as of December 2025 is relatively small with about 16 members on average.

Membership is declining, with about 32% of clubs having fewer than 12 members. 7 clubs were 5 or less members. SISEAP HQ reported end of March 2026 that 10 clubs (comprising 85 Soroptimists) were un-financial and still to finalise membership returns.

### 1. Increase membership numbers

Develop and engage all SISEAP clubs in recruitment strategies	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• It has been forecast for some time that there will be a continued slow decline in SISEAP membership.</li> <li>• This may be that most clubs in SISEAP have an aging membership, which, together with financial (membership fees) and social restraints, (the cost-of-living crisis) may make recruitment/ retention strategies difficult during 2026.</li> <li>• It has also been recognised that capitation fees converted to AUD\$, in some countries, is a strong barrier to membership retention and recruitment. (A high-level review will be conducted on how SISEAP can address this).</li> <li>• Since <b>2021</b> total membership has dropped by some 346 (15.3%), despite recruiting new members.</li> <li>• Effective SISEAP communication across all clubs is a challenge. Important information and opportunities sent via email are often not read due to members having a lack of internet access or suitable technology. In some cases, members may engage with the Federation via mobile phone only.</li> <li>• To address this overall trend, the strategy of the new SISEAP M2M campaign (launched in October 2025) aims to retain and increase current membership.</li> <li>• Assisted by the campaign, the membership team saw an increase of 96 new members from the commencement of the campaign to the end of December 2025.</li> <li>• The 2026 SISEAP Membership award will recognise a club with the highest membership recruitment during the period from October 2025 to June 2026.</li> </ul>

- In 2025, Soroptimist International of North Canterbury collaborated with female Deputy Principals and students at Rangiora High School in New Zealand to establish a club within the school. Participation in the club provided leadership experience, the chance to work on projects, and fostered fellowship among members. The club selected a project titled 'Brave New Zealand' and began working to raise awareness of sexual violence among youth in Aotearoa New Zealand. The club continues in 2026 as an outreach project from SI North Canterbury under a new President, with current numbers of around thirty. **Note** that the student numbers are not included in **Table 2**.
- Resources are available via the website to guide clubs in setting up High School clubs in their communities.
- The uptake of Awardee membership has been steady over the last four years. It is an opportunity to recognise and 'reward' outstanding young women in the community. Awardee membership can often advance to general membership. Once their term has ended many Awardees are joining a club as a full member.
- The number of Awardees remained static of 24 as at Dec 2025.
- Clubs are encouraged to engage with our young, diverse communities while increasing the profile of Soroptimists.
- It has been suggested that existing younger members of clubs be asked as to what they see the clubs of the future looking like. To this end a "Young" Members Forum is being planned by the M2M Committee.
- There is also some debate as to what a "young" member is in our current membership profile.

List of Countries & Membership	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Table 5</b> outlined in Appendix One summarises membership by Region.</li> <li>• <b>Table 3</b> below summaries relative membership distribution by country category, showing a decline in membership since 2022 of 369 members (-16.1%). 2022 the year closed with 2,287 members, YE 2025 1916 members.</li> <li>• As at 31st December 2025 ten Clubs had closed in the past year, with three planning to close early in 2026; SI Sydney, SI Brisbane South, and SI Helena.</li> <li>• The Membership Committee noted that SI Sydney was chartered in 1937. It was the first club to charter in Australia. 	<p>also celebrates International Volunteer Day, formally thanking members for the work they do.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• During 2025, several clubs celebrated membership milestones – SI Goulburn celebrated its 70th anniversary of service! The Region of Malaysia 25 years, SI Darkan, Mongolia 20 years, and SI Ulaanbaatar 25years. SI Albany and SI Wellington were examples of clubs that recognised member milestones with special Soroptimist events in 2025.</li> <li>• It was good to see so many clubs throughout SISEAP aligned with International Women’s Day by celebrating the day with public speaker events, luncheons and other membership activities.</li> <li>• SI Gore celebrated International Women’s Day 2026 with a speaker evening and invited local high school senior students.</li> </ul>
Provide tangible benefits for belonging	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Clubs need to have impactful projects, and they need to continually highlight successful programs and projects.</li> <li>• The SISEAP Membership Convenor produced Bulletin articles with themes on leadership, communication, celebrating Volunteer Month, a reflection on participation in civil society and the impact of our Soroptimist service in our communities. (See SISEAP Membership news).</li> <li>• Throughout 2025, clubs consistently shared Facebook and Instagram posts to highlight their Soroptimist membership activities. These included many important advocacy efforts and shared experiences. This was especially evident with so many club public events during the 16 Days of Activism in November/December 2025.</li> <li>• While the use of technology to provide a meeting forum can be helpful, the loss of or reduction of face-to-face interaction (within clubs &amp; between clubs) can lead to the feeling that “something” is being lost. This can often be the sharing of ideas and/or encouragement of others.</li> <li>• Many Clubs are good at acknowledging their members and it would be great to see more of this.</li> </ul>
Increase members’ engagement with all aspects of the Soroptimist movement. (Examples)	<p><b>Noting some highly successful activities that can result in attracting members.</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• During 2025/26, member social media posts included United Nations days of: International Women’s Day, World Environment Day, International Day of the Girl Child, Elimination of Violence Against Women and the SISEAP Membership Month.</li> <li>• Social media posts from Malaysia provided an insight into members' participation in many activities, e.g., Tree Planting in SI Seremban, and a talk on Child Abuse and Sexual Harassment.</li> <li>• SI Petaling Jaya’s community outreach project (SPOT), Stop Violence against Women, was well attended by many young women.</li> <li>• SI South Perth, Mandurah, Maylands Peninsula Clubs hold a monthly Orange Café, a public social gathering with a purpose, with women all wearing orange, raising awareness to end the violence against women.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● SI Victoria's participation in Walk Against Violence as part of 16 days of Activism, with members dressed in Orange to walk and honour the women and girls whose lives have been lost.</li> <li>● SI Lautoka held a local schoolgirl Oratory Competition with the IWD 'Give to Gain' theme. In March, they organised a members 'Saturday Service' event, an environment-focused street cleanup.</li> <li>● SI Sigatoka Region held an IWD event to empower the women's community through education, health awareness, and information on legal rights, in line with this year's theme, "Give to Gain."</li> <li>● SI Morton North celebrated International Women's Day with their annual 'Be Inspired' event, presenting nine outstanding women with Inspirational Woman of the Year Awards. The 'Educate to Lead Woman of the Year' award went Thresha Dingu, who was a charter member of the SI Wewak club. Congratulations to you all!</li> <li>● SI Victoria clubs of Shepparton, Geelong and Ballarat together welcomed over 500 guests to their successful International Women's Day events.</li> <li>● The SIANZ National Project (Heal the Teal, Reduce the Impact of Ovarian Cancer on New Zealand Women) has helped with membership recruitment and retention: 57% SIANZ clubs reported the national project helped attract members. Four clubs reported membership increases in 2025: one reported 7 new members, including 3 senior high school students who were then enthusiastic about starting a school club; another attracted 5 new members, and a third welcomed 1 new member. 50% of clubs believe that the national project helps them retain new members.</li> <li>● The SIANZ Frocktober event during Ovarian Cancer Month was fun with a purpose. Embraced by so many clubs, SI New Plymouth members won the prize for the most funds raised to help raise awareness of ovarian cancer.</li> <li>● The above projects demonstrate the engaged enthusiasm and fun of the members. It is a team effort bringing together the best elements of membership and programme.</li> </ul>
Dual Membership	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● There remain great opportunities to grow this new membership category YE 31<sup>st</sup> December 2024-9 vs YE 2025 17.</li> <li>● This Category of membership can be used as a means of strengthening and supporting Clubs where they are struggling.</li> </ul>
Support Clubs	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● In April 2025, due to declining membership numbers, a call to action to the membership committee was made by President-Elect Anthea Penny.</li> <li>● Our key tasks were to rebuild membership and to strategically strengthen the Federation. The team also determined that there were a number of training resources and requirements that clubs wished to have provided.</li> <li>● A sub-committee was formed to work on a Member2Member campaign, one that would adapt and flex to identified membership needs.</li> <li>● Initially led by Anthea Penny, the brief was for the team to have a strong focus on membership retention and growth strategies</li> <li>● In September 2025, the Member2Member Campaign was launched.</li> </ul>

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Now led by Kerry Beer, the M2M team is planning on further developments to support and encourage membership retention and recruitment into 2026.</li> <li>● An incentive program was introduced to encourage recruitment of new members.</li> <li>● During this period we added 67 new members.</li> <li>● Some clubs are still at risk. The membership team is actively working with those clubs to assist them in becoming more stable.</li> </ul>
<p>A focused lens on membership &amp; leadership.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● To give clear focus to future leaders, the current Club leadership roles document is seen as too 'wordy' and needs to be simplified and made more readable. A draft is yet to be finalised.</li> <li>● Anecdotally, there is a general reluctance by members to take on leadership roles in SISEAP. Feedback suggests the roles are seen by many as too onerous and bureaucratic.</li> <li>● To urgently address this, many SISEAP clubs are actively looking at ways to streamline the club leadership responsibilities and make meetings less formal and membership more convivial.</li> <li>● We need to emphasise that the club is a team, and we need members to work alongside each other.</li> <li>● New members into a club who may wish to take on Club positions should be encouraged with mentoring from existing members.</li> <li>● As part of the M2M Campaign, a new SISEAP Leadership Program is being developed. This will be presented by M2M trainer, Jill Godwin of SI Brisbane Water. This program is scheduled to commence mid-2026. To take part, expressions of interest are now sought.</li> </ul>
<p>Provide membership training on leading in the volunteer sector</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● In February 2026 (conducted by Anthea Penny), a Thriving Futures workshop was held at the Fiji Regional meeting.</li> <li>● Initiated by the M2M campaign team and facilitated by Jill, a successful Club Presidents forum was held on 24<sup>th</sup> February 2026.</li> <li>● A diverse group of current and past presidents shared experiences and tips to improve club leadership, governance and systems.</li> <li>● A forum for Club Secretaries is planned for April 2026, and for other club roles is planned over the next few months.</li> <li>● During 2025, most of the membership documents that required updating had been completed by the Membership Team and placed on the SISEAP website</li> </ul>
<p>SISEAP Sisters on Line</p> 	<p>Report submitted by Kim Hainsworth – President, SISEAP Sisters online</p> <p>Currently, membership has remained solid with members from Australia, New Zealand, and Vietnam, and we are excited about potential new members from Singapore and the Solomon Islands showing interest. Thanks to the feedback and support from members in Vietnam, the club has been able to assist individuals in need in Vietnam.</p> <p>The club will continue with their social media campaigns to raise awareness and educate, particularly around the specific SISEAP UN days. Advocacy remains a priority</p>

	<p>for members, and they are always looking for ways to work with other clubs and federations.</p> <p>Sisters on Line are committed to supporting the New Zealand Ovarian Cancer Project alongside all SI clubs in New Zealand, aligning with their mission to promote women's health.</p> <p>They value six friendship links around the world, which have provided wonderful opportunities to connect and network through various catch-up events throughout the year.</p> <p>Members continue to navigate challenges related to different time zones, currencies, bank accounts and recruitment, which require ongoing attention and creativity.</p>
<p>Friendship Link Annual Report</p>	<p>Report Submitted by Eileen Middleton -SISEAP Friendship Link Coordinator 2024-2026</p> <p>The past year has been one of consolidation with processes and checks, previously established in 2024, utilised to ensure the appropriate management and recording of requests for friendship links within the Federation. This includes a record of historical friendship links, as well as those formed in the last two-year period.</p> <p>Clubs have been encouraged via regular reminders in the Federation eBulletin to use the online form under the Membership Section of the SISEAP website when requesting new friendship links or changes to their information on the database. Twenty-five requests over the biennium comprise:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Ten requests for friendship links with clubs outside of SISEAP</li> <li>• Eight requests for friendship links with clubs within SISEAP</li> <li>• Seven requests for changes to the Friendship Link Database</li> </ul> <p>All requests for friendship links, bar three awaiting completion of documentation at the time of writing this report, have been confirmed. On the establishment of the link, each partnered club has received a SISEAP Certificate of Friendship, along with a letter of congratulations on behalf of the Federation, with the Friendship Link Database updated accordingly.</p> <p>Additionally, there have been eight requests from clubs outside of SISEAP for friendship links with our clubs and again, these have all been confirmed.</p> <p>Following the establishment of their friendship links, clubs are encouraged to communicate any joint projects, visits or celebrations as they progress with their partnerships. As mentioned last year, we would be keen to see a more streamlined connection between these outcomes and SISEAP's project data; something to be progressed in the coming biennium.</p> <p>While the Friendship Link Database has been updated and improved, review is continual. Some clubs advise of their decision to cease their friendship links, while others report a lack of communication with their partnered club and there is a need to follow up if these remain viable. Clubs across the globe, including in our own Federation, "come and go" and keeping track is ongoing. A working relationship has been established in this regard with the SIGBI Friendship Link Coordinator and achieving similar communication with the relevant contacts in other Federations is in progress.</p>

	<p>SISEAP Friendship Links are hopeful that by continuing to remind clubs of the value of friendship links and providing an easy process to enable these, along with continued efforts to keep abreast of changes, will foster the growth of friendship links within and beyond our Federation. For Coordinator Eileen, these friendships and partnerships very much reflect the spirit of Soroptimism.</p>
