FROM OUR PROGRAMME CONVENOR



Thank you to members who get involved with broader policy impacts and who contribute directly to our report database, which we rely upon to give grassroots credibility to our voice. The theme this month is **Femicide** – when women and girls die. This year, the 16 days of action to eliminate violence against women continues from **25th November (UN day for EVAW) to 10 December (UN Human Rights Day)**.

Please wear orange to gently recognise those women who are impacted in any way, from covert control to femicide. Women die in many ways, like intense violence by an intimate partner, or in slow ways like through neglect, hunger, and danger from someone else who has control over basic human rights. Please wear orange to show you care – scarf, earrings, dress, suit, jumper, flowers in your hair, foils in your hair,

whatever. One Club is painting shoes for every local death this year – Townsville Breakwater. Others in Western Australia are placing orange signs with just a number in shop windows, so people will ask why – because the numbers are too big for discounts. They are the numbers of females in their local community **who have died this year**. All of these things educate us while encouraging us to change laws, prevention systems, crisis care and attitudes towards better ways to have relationships. In many cases young people – boys and girls need to have the skills and confidence to speak up, negotiate, and communicate their way through perceived problems and anger. In the global sphere, women die in other ways. Yesterday **COP27 on Climate** began in Egypt and it recognises that disproportionate numbers of girls and women are killed from neglect with poor warning systems, evacuation plans, and disaster risk reduction. The first to die are the disabled, elderly, children, and women as their carers. In 2018, within 2 hours during a typhoon **72% of those who died were female**. This might be conservative. As a result of the APMCDRR session in September/October, women's voices now lead the **Sendai Review** for disasters. Our SISEAP region is vulnerable in 4 of the 4 measures globally (hazard exposure, risk of great harm, coping capacity, and adaptive resilience). On 14 November the COP27 theme is gender and climate. **Hotlinks for COP27 events online** mean you can listen but not speak: [HERE](#)

As carers, women take 97% of the workload in most of our societies. Please see the **Asia Pacific Care Economy** reports and the World Economic Forum strategic analysis diagrams. Soroptimist International South East Asia Pacific was invited to give evidence in an Australian Senate Select Committee of Inquiry on Work and Care, with benchmarking including our region and OECD. Responses to the 8 recommendations and Hansard are found [HERE](#). We rely on Soroptimist International Position statements on Economic Empowerment [HERE](#) and Covid Gender Inequality [HERE](#).

In the coming months we are preparing for **6 to 17 March 2023**, the **CSW67** Commission for the Status of Women in New York (but many events will be held online). The theme is generally **Digital Democracy**. [HERE](#). If you wish to **fund yourself** to attend as a Soroptimist please apply [HERE](#). Accommodation and flights are expensive but those who attended in the past have valued their experiences, connections and advocacy as a good investment. We in SISEAP plan to conduct a parallel event (on women, technology and climate) because it sharpens the scope to our resilience capacity and strengthens our progress towards digital systems. This focuses on our women's needs in extreme events and the slow burn of climate change. Other nations are interested too.

In other news, during the month, we held a webinar on International Day of the Girl Child with a focus on **Girls not Brides** in Indonesia, Malaysia, Fiji and other options for girls in Myanmar, and New Zealand. See the recording [HERE](#).

Recently, the **Soul Sisters** webinar provided an opportunity for learning about local food with its cultural history, as well as practical projects in the location hosting the cooking show. Brisbane Club which was established in 1949, made lamingtons (sponge fingers dipped in chocolate and rolled in coconut) and spoke about their projects and how to conduct advocacy. In conclusion, our Clubs are **doing meaningful work** for the benefit of all of society, while representing the value of

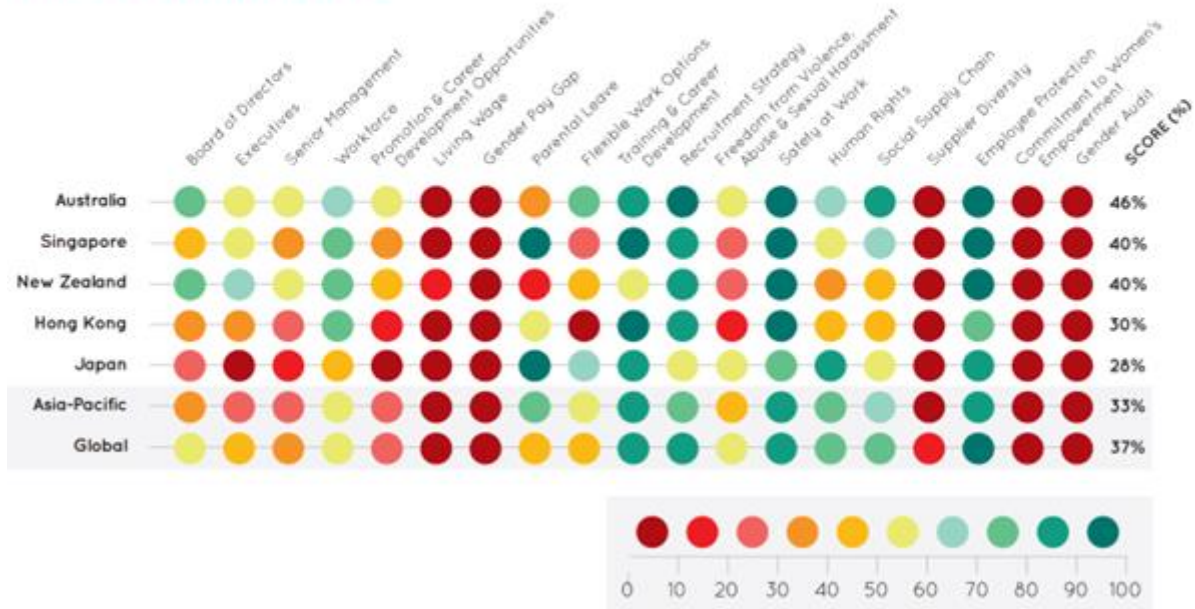
The active participation of non-governmental organizations (NGOs) is a critical element in the work of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW). We NGOs are influential in shaping the current global policy framework on women's empowerment and gender equality founded by the [Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action](#). We continue to play an important role in holding international and national leaders accountable for the commitments they made in the Platform for Action. MARKET RANKING

The highest scoring markets in Asia-Pacific for gender equality are Australia (46%), followed by Singapore (40%) and New Zealand (40%).

These all score above the Asia-Pacific average of 33% and the global average of 37%. Hong Kong (30%) and Japan (28%) are the lowest scoring markets in the region.

FIGURE 9 / MARKETS HEAT MAP

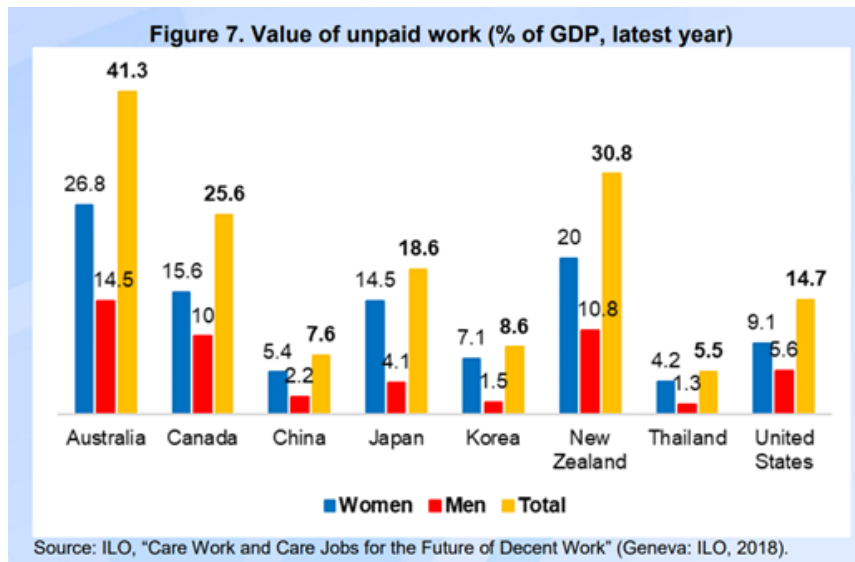


Women's Work and the Economy

During October- early November, there has been a flurry of potential changes across South East Asia including:

- Women's work, view [HERE](#)
- Care economy, modern slavery, view [HERE](#)
- Trade relationships, education programs, infrastructure investment view [HERE](#)
- Asia Pacific Gender Equality work snapshot 2022 [HERE](#)

As seen in NGO reports for Asia Pacific. Furthermore some countries signed agreements for better action, technology and funding for systems to support vulnerable people. These things only happen when the vulnerable people get a voice to their community leaders, faith based leaders, provincial and national governments guided by international agreements. That is essentially the role of NGOs to guide better futures. Our Clubs are doing good things at many levels, from **writing letters, running webinars and events, giving evidence to Parliamentary Inquiries, to helping shape laws** and policies in their communities.



The Australian Senate Select Committee invited Soroptimist to give further evidence to strengthen the interim report on Work and Care. See statement [HERE](#). Of the 8 recommendations proposed, we are shaping a new one on migrant workers as well as addressing 4 we were concerned about:

- More recognition of **unpaid and low-paid workers caring for ageing** and people with disability and dementia (Childcare was well argued already and new budget was assigned for 26 week paid parental leave under the new Australian Wellbeing Budget)
- **Benchmarking** across the APEC countries and OECD, where we can learn lessons
- **Right to disconnect** (many workers in casual roles are torn between shifts, and never get enough sleep so their own mental and physical health)
- Flexibility, definitions in the Fair Work Act, because the **onus is always on the worker** to be strong enough to speak up
- **Duty of care** by the employer
- **Migrant** workers undertake less-skilled labour (even though they might be qualified abroad) so we need to ensure they are strong enough to negotiate fair treatment and pay
- strengthen systems to **support indigenous peoples** need and carers for vulnerable people like the ageing and people with disability and dementia. The concept of everybody in the family and community takes responsibility for caring for children, including the value of elders as cultural educators with the sense of belonging in the communities, no matter what family structure exists.

FROM OUR NATIONAL PRESIDENTS



SI Jakarta Project

Note from National President Tjandra Kerton: "*SI Jakarta's Isla Winarto, Project Director of the Lombok, Indonesia: Earthquake Recovery through Water, Shelter and Capacity Building Project, provides a summary of and an update on this project that has been ongoing since 2019.*"

SI Jakarta's project in Lombok, Indonesia originally provided a poor village of 124 inhabitants with water and WASH facilities. Funding was from the then SI President's Appeal, and SISWP President's Special Appeals. In Phase 2, SIJ has provided ongoing capacity building and income generating programs for the women, mainly in weaving (using both natural and synthetic dyes) and sewing. Community awareness programs have emphasised the importance of health/sanitation; environmental management; youth mentoring; and general education.



More focus is now also on basic entrepreneurship training for the women. This includes budgeting, marketing on-line, quality control, and adapting to market demands. The items produced by the women are being sold both domestically and overseas.

The impact of climate change is a regular discussion topic with the villagers. Through this, the villagers are learning the importance of water conservation and protecting their environment.

Overall, the project is progressing very well, in terms of community-driven development and participation. It has also promoted women as defenders of water, of disaster preparedness, and significantly contributed to women's empowerment and leadership.

Following the Money - Make sure your funding efforts are recognised

Just a reminder that the Programme Reporting Database is based on what Clubs do in a Calendar year (January 1st to December 31st). If your Project runs over this period, you should divide it into Stage 1 and Stage 2 - to allow you to report what you have done for the year.

Remember when reporting a Project you will need to provide detailed information on:

1. What was the problem your project was addressing
2. What you did to address this problem. List the tasks undertaken and show how the Club members involved in the planning and implementation of the project.
3. What you expected the outcome of your Project to be. How did you measure the success of it?

If your Project resulted in donations of money or goods, or the awarding of scholarships, you should also submit a separate Donation Report or Scholarship Report. This will enable the Federation to optimise the use of the database for future reporting and enable it run a Donation and or Scholarship summary direct from the database.

Don't forget to use the Zone Programme Coordinators as your first point of contact if you have any problems.

AROUND THE FEDERATION

SI Port Pirie



SI Port Pirie have been engaging with Girl Guides for some years now as a way of celebrating the **Day of the Girl Child**. Making kites and flying them is great fun! This was discovered by ten Crystal Brook Girl Guides aged from 6 to 12, their three leaders and four members of Soroptimist International of Port Pirie as they celebrated this special day at the Crystal Brook Guide Hall in October.

Prior to the day, the guides decorated their blank kites with messages and pictures, advocating what girls should be able to do. The messages showed deep thought about the topic as well as empathy with their less fortunate peers throughout the world. For example: girls should be able to **”speak up, be loved, read, go to school, get a good education, decline forced marriage, have a flexible job, wear their choice of clothes, play sport, go to friends’ houses to play”**.

After constructing the kites from the kits with help from leaders and Soroptimists, the girls trooped out onto the nearby oval and launched them successfully. Despite a very threatening sky earlier in the day, the sun and breeze appeared just in time for the exercise.

Soroptimists Jenny Hughes, Heather Hunt and Bev Clarke and “Soroptimister” Rooka Ramsay enjoyed the afternoon as much as the girl guides! Back in the hall they discussed how to display their kites to others in the town, namely a display in a Crystal Brook shop window and at the local Primary School assembly. Group Leader Lorraine Saunders commented that “the whole exercise was very worthwhile” and “it was a great event”, sentiments shared by the Soroptimists, who hope to carry out other activities with the Girl Guides. Both groups follow the UN 17 Global Goals for Sustainable Development.

SIROM - Malaysia Long Tanyit in Sarawak Flood Management Training

In 2018, SIROM launched a project to bring clean water to rural communities in Sarawak and Sabah. The remote Penang village of Long Tanyit in Sarawak was selected for the pilot project as it had no access to clean water or sanitation, electricity, or access to internet. Clinics were located 8 hours by 4 -wheel drive vehicle from Bintulu. Logging and deforestation have polluted the river that runs beside the 3 longhouses that the 300 villagers call home. With sponsorship from the **SI President’s Appeal (2017-2019) a Rainwater Harvesting** system and a small dam to provide a back-up gravity-fed source of clean were constructed. 6 +20 women were trained in organic farming methods.

In **2021 floods devastated** the village, farmlands and their food economy. Women were trained in alternative income ventures, and in climate resilience. On 12-13 October, 2022 SIROM with support from Heineken Malaysia and Spark Foundation **conducted a workshop for 15 women from Long Tanyit** to educate them on flood risks and mitigation. The Director of DID (Drainage and Irrigation) Department, Sarawak, Ir Ahmad Denney bin Haji Ahmad Fauzi , was invited to provide the Keynote address while an Engineer from DID in KL gave a talk on risks of flooding and how to take precautions before, during and after floods. SI Townsville Breakwater



Townsville Breakwater Soroptimists, North Queensland are determined to turn Townsville orange for the 16 days of activism and they have engaged a number of community and service groups to help them take on this

task.

In one instance their callout for donations of unwanted shoes resulted in a variety of donated articles being left at designated sites around the city. The intended outcome was that these would all be painted orange. With the support of a local Bunnings hardware store, who provided the paint and space to undertake this activity, a number of community members, staff and Soroptimists spent an enjoyable time undertaking the task.

On another occasion and to coincide with recent school holidays, members joined children at the **Townsville's Youth Justice Centre** to paint more shoes and an **old bike** to be part of the 16 days exhibition. The young people collaborated on the project and heard from SITB members who spoke about the campaign to stop violence against women.

Another event had members working with **local Girl Guides** who demonstrated their creative, thrifty and environmental credentials, repurposing old corrugated advertising signs, old milk bottles and fabric scraps into wonderful **bright orange signs, lanterns and bunting**.

In the most recent activity members went along to a **local bookshop to crochet and knit** ready to yarn and fabric bomb around Townsville. Members on each occasion make sure that the volunteers are aware of the background of the 16 Days of Activism. With **thousands of sexual assaults recorded every year in Queensland**, this project is helping to educate the next generation on how to respect women and prevent future cycles of violence – all in a fun and hands on way.

The final outcome of all the orange preparation is that from the **25th November til the 10th of December** all the orange articles will be on display at numerous locations around the city. They are sure to stand out and raise awareness on a very important issue. Follow the Club on Facebook [HERE](#) to see the outcome.

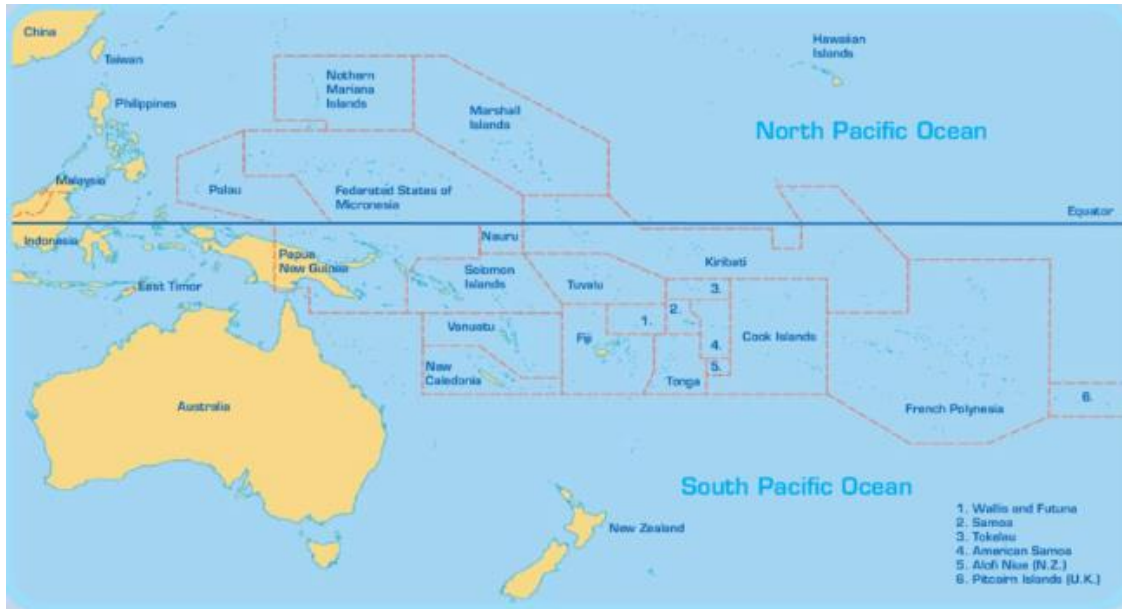
SI Gold Coast

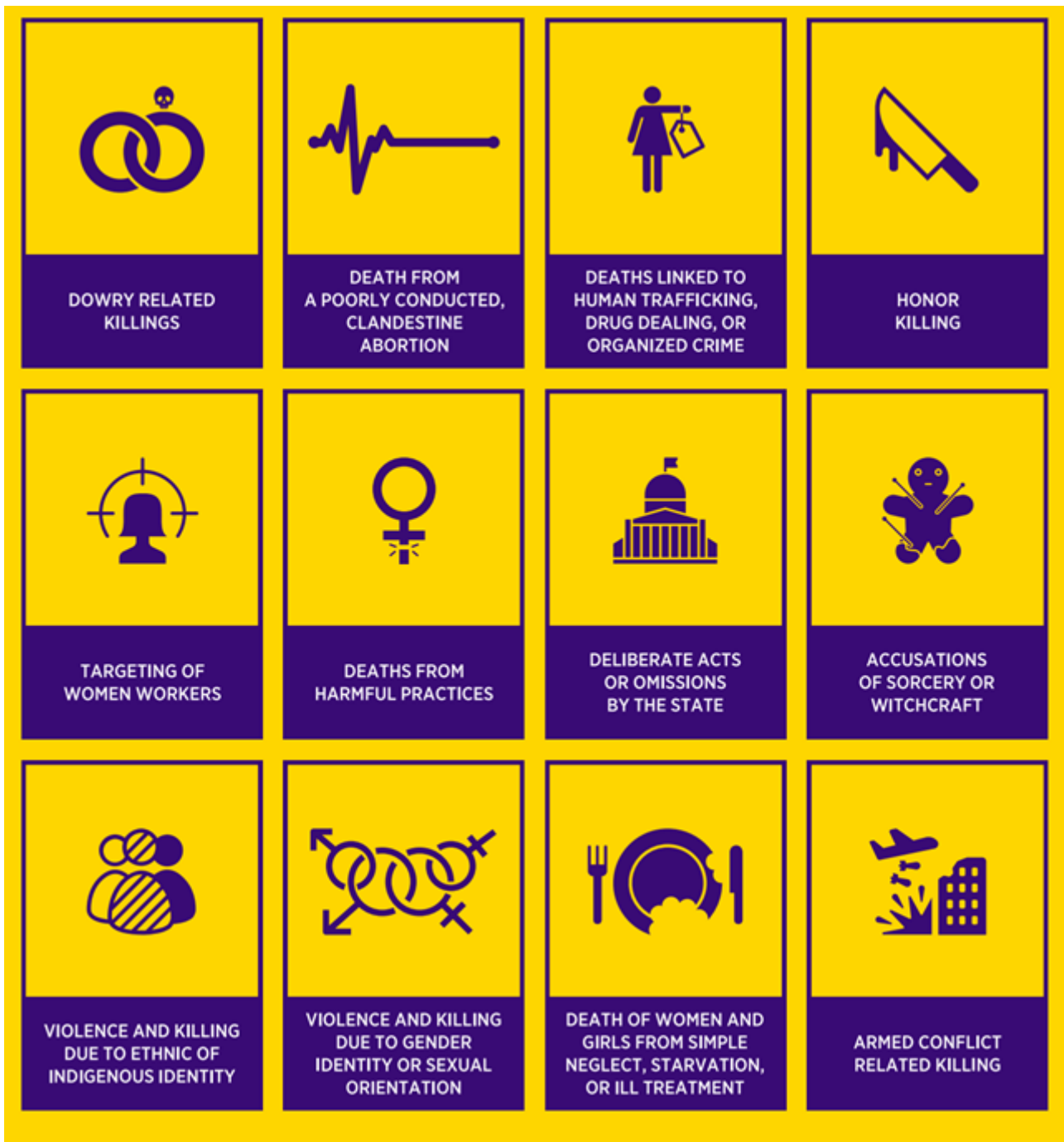
kindred organisations sometimes so our impact is amplified.
